My View on Church Avenue

We're still dancing in the aisles and celebrating the recent addition of eleven new members—and their nine young children—into our church family. Four baptisms are scheduled in the next few weeks, and summer weddings are being planned.

Yet, the latest statistics of the Presbyterian Church (USA) show that membership declined by 43,175 last year, continuing a trend dating to the mid-1960s. In fact, we're nearly half the size we were as an American Protestant denomination in 1983. The PC(USA) is now the ninth largest Christian denomination in the United States.

There are as many speculations for this hemorrhage as there are remaining Presbyterians. Some people say it's because we've been in conflict over basic doctrinal tenets and practices. Others believe our worship is stuffy and our music out-of-date. Sociologists tell us that it is simply the shifting of cultural values and the decline of traditional institutions which no longer appeal to the young—we're just dying off. If we were to compare the PC(USA) to a city . . . we'd be Pittsburgh!

There were some positive signs in those denominational statistics: adult baptisms increased as did Sunday School attendance. One-third of PC(USA) congregations reported membership increases, the racial-ethnic portion of membership increased to 7.1 percent, and contributions increased by \$3.4 million.

We rejoice with all the signs of growth and life at Community Church, but we need to admit that we're better at fellowship than we are at evangelism. Evangelism is our commission to bring others to Jesus Christ, and to lead them to his family, the church. But we're very, very timid, aren't we?

When was the last time you invited someone to church . . . and to join you for lunch after the service? Who's on your list to invite to the Wednesday Bible Study or the Downtown Discussion Group? Have you ever brought a young family to Sunday School? A singer to choir practice? When was the last time you told someone what God has done for you?

Friends, be bold! The door of the church is always open and, often, so is the door of your home. But people don't walk into your home uninvited . . . Do they?

As reported above, our operating deficit for the year so far is \$13,788. Income is \$9,032 under budget while expenses are essentially even. While not critical yet, our actual deficit is about \$8,800 greater than projected.

CPCBA Considers Implementing the Acts 16:5 Initiative

Members of the staff, several elders, and the Planning Committee have been considering the **Acts 16:5 Initiative** introduced to them at a two-day Presbytery seminar last February. This plan for congregational renewal, vision-setting, growth and outreach has been developed by the nationally-known church consultant, Dr. Stan Ott, pastor of Pleasant Hills Church in the South Hills.

The results of the congregational survey taken by worshipers on May 21st will factor into the process. The local group that has been reviewing this plan hopes to make a presentation to the Executive Committee at their regular meeting on June 12.

The title of the program comes from scripture: ***"So the churches were strengthened in the faith and increased in members daily."*** (Acts 16:5)

Book Review of *What Jesus Meant* A Recent Donation to the Library from Prudence Emery

Jesus was not made flesh in order to invent Christianity—or to found a church—or to promote any politics. He was subversive...a radical.



Such are the claims of Pulitzer Prize winning author Gary Wills in *What Jesus Meant*. I opened this slim volume with some dread. Wills and I sit in very different pews in our political and faith lives, so I read his works gingerly—lest he convert me.

His prose is clear, his scholarship daunting. Where would he lead me in this adventure? And would I enjoy the journey—or its destination?

Wills led me down some old familiar paths to some remarkable conclusions. Wills, the college professor, says that we don't need learned "rabbis" to teach us—Jesus was our rabbi. Wills, the Roman Catholic, attacks his church's notion of apostolic succession: "Why do Anglicans, met together in Jesus' name, need a bishop from Rom when they have Jesus in their midst?" (p. 82) Wills, the male, points out the importance of women in Christ's ministry and their roles in early gatherings of Christ's people: prophets, managers, partners in mission. "The original gatherings of Jesus, still reflecting his teaching, made up the most egalitarian earthly society then in existence." (p. 51)

Gary Wills' Jesus challenges us to confront our attitudes—and our behaviors—in many ways. I found the confrontation inspiring, disturbing and thrilling.

What Jesus Meant by Gary Wills is the latest addition to CPCBA's Pomeroy Library. It is a gift from Prudence Emery in honor of her mother, Helen.

Reading the Bible and the Confessions: The Presbyterian Way by Jack Rogers, Professor of Theology at San Francisco Theological Seminary.

Prof. Rogers analyzes and reviews the various authoritative interpretations of the confessions along with related biblical references. From the back cover: "For Presbyterians, Holy Scripture and the *Book of Confessions* are the primary sources of authority and guidance. However, authorities are helpful only if they are interpreted correctly. While much has been written about biblical interpretation, this is the first book to apply the principles of biblical interpretation to understanding the *Book of Confessions*."

This We Believe: Eight Truths Presbyterians Affirm, by Stephen W. Plunkett, Pastor of St. Andrew Presbyterian Church in Denton, Texas.

Pastor Plunkett provides an introduction to the Christian faith in general and then segues into eight significant truths for Presbyterians. Examples include: "God Is in Charge", "Jesus Christ Reveals God's Love" and "We are the Church Together". **This We Believe** provides a succinct and perhaps provocative summary of core Presbyterian beliefs.

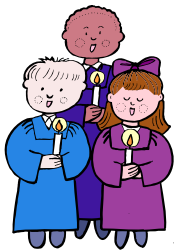

Avonworth and Bellevue Meals on Wheels**

"They say that what goes around, comes around." The Bible wants us to be aware that serving others is following the directives and the examples of Jesus. The health community claims that research shows that a longer and healthier life may occur due to "good works". Thinking about others, showing compassion, giving of your time, energy and money, all take us out of ourselves and allow God to work through us in a transforming way that is close to a miracle.

Right next door in our community men and women are doing just that. The Avonworth and Bellevue Meals on Wheels are two great helping organizations. Each week hours are being spent in the kitchens of the Emsworth St. James Lutheran Church and the North Minister Church in Bellevue.

Five days a week the excellent cooks in both kitchens prepare delicious hot meals for lunch and a sandwich with snacks for dinner.
