Summer Worship to Offer a Variety of Music

God probably knew what he was doing with me when he didn't make me a journalist. Somehow he knew that in my life's work I wouldn't need an "objective gene." He did, on the other hand, give me an enlarged "opinion gene." I tell you this because I am unashamedly, unabashedly, and proud almost to the point of sinfulness, of the music ministry at CPCBA. The only counter balance that keeps me on the righteous side of being proud, (Is there a righteous side of being proud? I'll leave that to the theologians.) is that it is tempered with gratitude for each person who contributes to the music at CPCBA.

Sunday, June 17th will be the last Sunday that the Chancel Choir sings until September. We need a rest.

During the summer we will have a wide variety of musical offerings, including a visit on June 24th by soprano, Nancy Klimcheck, who will be singing *Let the Bright Seraphim* from an oratorio by Handel. The piece is actually a duet for soprano and trumpet, and is pitched in D Major, the happiest of the 12 keys, and promises to thrill.

On July 8th, our own Renee Miskimmin will sing a jazz solo. We have all enjoyed Renee's singing since she began attending CPCBA on the Sunday after Brent died. Tom Jackson will be the organist that day. So many times people have said to me, "Nobody plays a hymn like Tom Jackson."

We will host three rising star teens from Pittsburgh Musical Theatre on July 15th. The music they will be singing for us will include music from the movie, "The Hunchback of Notre Dame," and the Broadway show, "The Secret Garden." If you're thinking that this doesn't sound like church music, you are right. Despite the fact that these selections were written for the popular culture, I think that you will conclude that this music is theologically sound and uplifting.

On July 29th, Jayne Schneider and Ginny Kardasz will sing a duet. We haven't seen much of Ginny lately and it will be nice to have her with us again.

On July 22nd and August 19th we will hold what we are calling Summer Choir. Choir members will meet in the sanctuary at 8:45 on those mornings to rehearse an easy anthem which we will sing at the 10:00 a.m. service. Did I say choir members? I meant to say anyone in the church or North Boros community is welcomed and encouraged to join us on those two dates. If you have ever wondered what it would be like to sing in a choir or haven't sung in a choir since high school, we'd love to have you. Just show up at 8:45. No robes and you can sit with your family except for when we sing. I promise not to badger you into joining the choir in the fall ...well, I'll try not to.

Summer Communion Schedule: July 3, August 5 and September 2

The whole worshipping community will gather to celebrate communion on three Sundays this summer at the 10:00 a.m. service: July 3, August 5, and September 2, the first Sunday of each month.

Throughout the rest of the year, when there are two worship services each Sunday, the 8:30 service always includes communion. Since there will not be an 8:30 service from June 10 through September 2, the three celebrations of the Lord's Supper have been added to the summer schedule.

The combined summer service (the schedule of two services will resume September 9) will give worshipers who regularly attend one or the other an opportunity to experience some elements of each. The summer communion services will have special music which is not normally a part of the 8:30 service. The communion will be distributed as is done at the 8:30 service where worshipers come to the front of the chancel. They are served the bread and the cup and partake as they are served. Then all return to their seats for the final hymn.

One additional communion service which is part of our tradition will be at the worship in ACORD park on August 26, followed by the church picnic.



My View on Church Avenue

Dear Friends,

On Children's Sunday, May 20, worshipers at 10:30 heard the Word proclaimed through the children and Melanie Hughes-Holcomb's recounting the journey of faith that our Sunday School took through the past school year starting with our ancestors Abraham and Sarah.

We also shared in the sacrament of baptism for Isaac and Aaron Schmitt as they took on their new identities in the family of faith. What great timing on a day that we celebrated ministry with and from our children, and it was Heritage Sunday on our Presbyterian calendar.

The Word was rightly proclaimed, which is what Calvin called one of the marks of the true church. As I said during the service, I chose then to save the message for the day for this issue of Revelations. So here is a modified version of the sermon that was preached at the 8:30 service, based on the scripture Deuteronomy 6:1-9.

Since this is Children's Sunday, here are some truths I read that children have learned.

- * No matter how hard you try, you can't baptize cats;
- * When your mom is mad at your dad, don't let her brush your hair;
- * Puppies still have bad breath after eating a Tic-Tac.

A more profound truth is found in the scripture today from Deuteronomy. It contains the Great Commandment: Love God with all your heart and soul, and mind. AND teach your children well.

That is just what the CPCBA Sunday School is all about. You can be sure that the focus is on getting the children to know the Bible stories and message by heart. You can also be sure that in the process, they know in their hearts that there are grownups in their lives – beyond their relatives –who love God and who also love them very much.

Complete awareness often comes with hindsight, so the students may not know how much time their teachers spend preparing to teach, or that the teachers give up time they may have wanted to spend reading the paper on Sunday morning and having a second cup of coffee. They may not know how the class the teacher prepares the hardest for turns out to be the one that occurs on a day when some students didn't get enough sleep the night before and so cannot concentrate, or they're excited about a family trip planned for later in the day.

The students may not know that their heritage includes people who give their treasure to have heat and light and supplies. They may not know that there are people who make sure they are welcomed and prayed for. The students may not know that there are people whose faith compels them to synchronize their faith life with their daily life so that they make the world a better place in which to grow, so that the students will eventually take their place in line.

We grownups don't live with constant awareness. Still our call is to teach about and how to love God with heart, soul, and might. When we can achieve that love, we are doing what God wants. Sunday School is a total experience for that learning.

Back in the 1880's, there was a little girl named Hattie May Wiatt. Her family belonged to a church in Philadelphia which had a small building and a large attendance, so large that worshipers had to get tickets for admission to every service. The Sunday School was crowded, too, and Hattie loved to attend.

One Sunday she was waiting in the crowd outside the gates. The pastor of the church, Russell H. Conwell happened by, picked Hattie up and carried her through the crowd to the Sunday School room.

The next day the pastor told Hattie that they planned to raise money for a new Sabbath School building so all the children could fit. Some time after this meeting, Hattie became seriously ill. The pastor visited her at home to pray. Hattie succumbed to her illness. Her grieving parents gave Rev. Conwell the money Hattie had gathered as her contribution toward the new building –fifty-seven cents.

Pastor Conwell announced to the congregation he had the first contribution to the building fund. He changed Hattie's coins into pennies and auctioned them off, raising \$250 with which a house was purchased.

A young man came to the pastor and asked if Rev. Conwell would agree to teach him theology because the young man discerned a call to ministry. The pastor agreed he would meet with the man one evening each week in the Sabbath School house. On the first evening seven young men arrived, all eager to study theology.

An aid society, established in Hattie Wiatt's memory, provided chairs, books, and teachers for an evening school. The house was organized as the Temple College, after Grace Baptist Temple, the founding church.

Russell H. Conwell became its first president. Grace Temple went on to establish two hospitals especially for the care of the poor. Eventually the college added departments of medicine, law, theology, household arts, normal school, and a teachers college. We know it today as Temple University.

Imagine how many graduates there have been over all these years who have taken their place in line to make the world a better place. Perhaps Patrick Fink, our outstanding young accompanist at the 8:30 service, can find out for us, since he will be enrolled as a freshman at Temple this fall.

Imagine the legacy of one church which followed the commandment to love God with heart, soul, and might so that their mission led to the lame walking, the recovery of sight for the blind, for justice to be championed, for music to fill the air, and for teachers to be trained to go into all the world.

Imagine what one church can do with an inspiring Sunday School...and fifty-seven cents.

It might even be possible to baptize a cat.

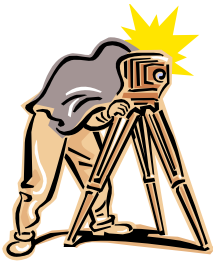
**CPCBA Sound Ministry Has Copies of

- A. All participating family units receive a free directory. Reasonably priced photo packages are available for purchase, but you are not obligated and will not be pressured to buy any,

Q. Why don't we wait for the new pastor to do a church directory?

- A. Completing a directory is a great project for the church to complete during an interim time. An updated church directory is a wonderful gift and helpful tool to give a new pastor. When the new pastor arrives, *Life Touch* will produce and distribute an adhesive pastor's page to insert in the front of our directory.

Q. I would love to help with the church directory. How can I help?

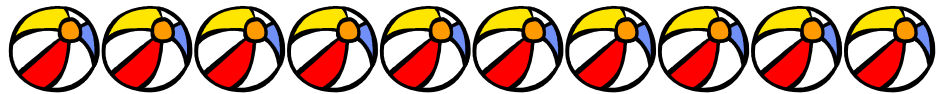
