Commissioner Staffing

New assignments: Welcome to new unit commissioner Leon Hutton.

Commissioner requirements and recruiting: There are a number of unit commissioner vacancies. Recruiting of new commissioners may be one of our

most serious challenges and is not the sole responsibility of the DC and ADCs! I strongly encourage every current commissioner to bring in one recruit before the end of the year, it will improve our service to our units and lighten the load on our Commissioner staff as a whole.

Roundtable Attendance for September

We had good turnout across the board at the September Roundtable, but the best Boy Scout turnout for some years.

- Cub Scout – 48 Scouters from 20 out of 36 units (56%)
- Boy Scout – 41 Scouters from 27 out of 33 units (82%)
- Venturing – 12 Scouters from 8 of 19 units (42%)

Commissioners are encouraged to attend roundtables when possible. Both to see who is there from their units, provide an opportunity to meet with unit leaders, and provide assistance to the Roundtable Commissioners.

Support to District

Membership – Commissioner assistance is needed in helping the District Membership Committee get JSN information from units, such as JSN Coordinators and JSN Nights. A spreadsheet with missing information will be coming soon by email.

Program – Fall Camporee (October 23-25), see details on pages 7 and 8. Commissioner assistance is needed in three areas:

- Friday night for parking – this is a critical safety issue !
- Saturday afternoon for campsite inspection
- Sunday morning for campsite/shower cleanliness checks and unit checkout.

This can be done by three separate groups of commissioners if all cannot show up for the entire weekend. I would like to have a volunteer to act as Camporee Lead Commissioner or at minimum a lead commissioner for each of these areas. If interested give me a call or drop an email.

Charter Renewal

Make sure to see the notes on page 5 for charter re-

newal timeline. The Recharter packets will be available for pickup at this month's roundtable. The new registration fee of \$15 will be in effect for next year for all units (whether rechartered before or after December 31st), see reminder note on page 7.

Remember that we will have three items to assist unit leaders in the last few months of this calendar year:

- Charter Renewal (Recharter)
- Unit Health Assessment
- Centennial Quality Unit Award – complete 2009 form and fill out unit goals on 2010 form.

Start preparing for these meetings with your unit leadership. We'll discuss more in the October Commissioner Meeting.

Support to Council Commissioner Staff during Centennial

Old Dominion Scouters are providing Commissioner support to Council Centennial activities as Commissioner Staff.

On request of the Council Commissioner, I developed a Monthly Commissioner's Centennial Bulletin to use in promulgating information throughout the Council (sent by email previously – the October issue will be out soon). I will count on commissioners to distribute this bulletin.

Old Dominion hosted the Virginia Central Area Commissioner Basic Training on September 19th at Messiah United Methodist Church with 10 graduates from other districts. John Pastino (ADC Training) was course coordinator, assisted by instructors Bill Nelson, Steve Richardson and Seth Distler. Great job to these instructors who represented the district well!

EAGLE SCOUTS

A New Milestone: Two Millionth Eagle Scout

MINNEAPOLIS – June 17, 2009 – To describe one Minnesota teenager as "one in a million" is an understatement – by half.

The Boy Scouts of America today announced that Anthony Thomas, 16, of Lakeville, Minnesota, has been named the 2 millionth Eagle Scout since the first Eagle badge was awarded in 1912.

Eagle Scout is the highest attainable rank in Boy Scouting and requires years of dedication and hard work. Scouts must demonstrate proficiency in leadership, service, and outdoor skills at multiple levels before achieving the Eagle rank. Fewer than 5 percent of Boy Scouts earn the Eagle badge.

Anthony, who will be a junior at Academy of Holy Angels in Richfield, Minn., has been involved in Scouting since age 7. A member of the Northern Star Council's Troop 471 at Prince of Peace Lutheran Church in Burnsville, Minnesota, he credits Scouting for his love of the outdoors and commitment to service. Adopted from Korea, Anthony volunteers as a counselor to Korean adoptees at Camp Choson. He also is active in his church and recently lettered in Service at his school. Anthony will spend part of his summer in New Orleans to help with ongoing cleanup work from Hurricane Katrina.

"Anthony represents everything that the Eagle badge stands for: character, integrity, leadership, and service to others," said Bob Mazzuca, Chief Scout Executive, Boy Scouts of America. "It is fitting that we honor the 2 millionth Eagle as we prepare to celebrate 100 years of service to the nation."

As the 2 millionth Eagle Scout, Anthony will serve as a youth ambassador for Scouting by participating in upcoming BSA's 100th Anniversary events such as the Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena, Calif.; the BSA's annual Report to the Nation in Washington, D.C.; and the National Scout Jamboree in 2010. SILVER BEAVER NOMINATIONS DUE NO LATER THAN DECEMBER 31



The Silver Beaver Award is a council-level award approved by the BSA National Court of Honor and is available to only about 2% of registered Scouters in any year. It is given for "exceptional service to youth on a council level." There are no specific criteria except for service to young people through the Scouting program and at least some involvement in youth work outside Scouting. Recipients are usually those who have extensive district and unit Scouting experience, usually exceeding 10 years in tenure, and almost always includes some service at the council level, such as Wood Badge, Pow Wow, Commissioner, Order of the Arrow or other service beyond the district level.

Anyone can submit a nomination which should go directly to the council Silver Beaver Committee no later than December 31, 2009. The nomination form is available on the council web site. Scouters interested in submitting nominations can get guidance and suggestions for write-ups by contacting Ken Davis at 703-941-9018 or daviskenjared@aol.com, or by contacting any member of the Old Dominion District Key 6 leadership.

CHARTER RENEWAL (or Recharter) BASICS

Rechartering is now official called "Charter Renewal" and it is almost upon us !

As last year, the step by step process is:

- Obtain recharter kit (will be available at October Roundtable)
- Unit Commissioners should work with unit leaders to pull all chartering information together, including new youth and adult applications
- When on-line rechartering opens (November 1st), unit leaders will enter all information – either via Scoutnet or Electronic Unit Management Software (like troopmaster).
- Unit leaders will print a charter renewal application
- Unit Commissioners should review for accuracy and to ensure they meet minimum requirements.
- Unit leaders then submit the charter renewals on-line and print out the final application.
- Unit leaders and Executive officers sign the appropriate form.

- Unit Commissioners should then provide a final review, sign and turn in the charter renewal package, preferably at the November Roundtable.

Some tips:

- You will need to include applications for all new youth and adults.
- DO NOT hold up the charter renewal package waiting for applications from recruiting efforts – these can be handed in separately after the recharter has been completed (but before the end of the year).
- Fees – a new member that is being submitted with the charter renewal in November must pay for 2 extra months (Nov, Dec) plus the full year of 2009.
- We will offer several training sessions in October and early November for unit leaders to help you get through the on-line recharter process. Date, time and location are to be determined but will be announced via email and through the Commissioner Staff.



FRIENDS OF SCOUTING

Family Friends of Scouting (FOS) is the National Capital Area Councils annual internal fundraising campaign. It is a very simple campaign; each unit simply asks their families via a presentation or letter, to make a tax deductible, monetary donation to our council. The funds provide key support to many services that all scouts benefit from. The 2010 campaign will start on January 1, 2010. In preparation for this, each unit will first need to designate a unit coordinator. This should be done by November 12.

The Old Dominion District will provide training for all the unit FOS coordinators on November 12 and December 10, 2010. Both sessions will be held right before roundtable at 7:00pm at Thomas Jefferson High School. Coordinators need to only attend one session.

Your district finance team looks forward to sharing some exciting new changes to the upcoming FOS campaign. Come find out what's in store!

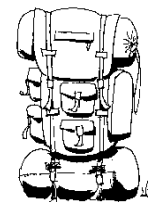

THE EAGLE'S PEAK

Life Scouts, Eagle Candidates, Unit Committees, and Eagle Scout Coordinators:

1. Clarification of the rules: Council has directed that Scouting units may add NO additional requirements to those specified in the Eagle Scout Project Workbook This includes any type of presentations to committees or Scouting units or any required follow-ups to Eagle Project, such as watering trees and plants or long-term maintenance.

At the discretion of the Scouting unit, a unit may support select Eagle Projects with service projects to provide short-term watering or maintenance program to establish the long-term success or viability of a completed project.

2. Please remember to use the NEW edition of the Eagle Scout Project Workbook and Eagle Scout application form. The 2009 edition of the Eagle Scout application form MUST be used by all Scouts effective immediately, as directed by BSA National Council. These are online at the National Capital Area Council, BSA National Council, and National Eagle Scout Association websites

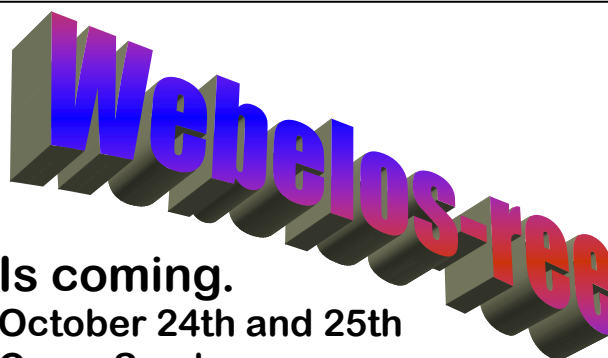

2010 FEE INCREASE

The BSA Executive Board unanimously passed a resolution at the business meeting on May 22nd to increase the traditional membership registration fee for all youth and adults to \$15 from its current \$10, effective January 1, 2010. The last fee increase, which was from \$7 to \$10, was in 2003.

A great deal of thought and consideration went into this decision. Consideration was given to an expected deficit to the National Council operating budget, the impact to program and council support, the necessary funding required over the next several years, the cost of implementing fee increases annually in systems and forms, as well as the overall fees paid by councils. Input was sought and received from staff and volunteers at the council level. Finally, given all these considerations, it was determined that the best approach was to increase the fee to this level and make every effort to hold that level for a period of at least three years.

The new registration fee will apply to this year's ODD charter renewal, which we will be undertaking this Fall for the charter year starting January 1, 2010. More information will follow regarding charter renewal, including schedule, deadlines and resources available from the District Commissioner Staff.

This is Scouting On-line

Here is where it all begins. Under the BSA training program "This is Scouting" is the entry-level course required for all Scout leader training. It is the foundation for building award winning "Quality Units". This fast paced course gives new leaders an overview of the entire Scout program. It covers: the purposes, aims and methods of Scouting; organization and structure of Scouting units; program funding; safe Scouting; and, the appropriate teaching methods for all ages and stages of youth and young adults. You do not need to repeat the class as you take additional leader specific training for new scouting positions you may move into. This course is only available online at <http://www.olec.scouting.org>.

Cub Scout Leader Position Specific Training October 21

Cub Scout Leader Training is position specific, covering all Cub Scout leader positions, and is required for adults to earn position specific training awards. *This is Scouting* and *Youth Protection Training* are prerequisites for this class but need not be repeated for those who are coming only to be trained in a new Cub Scout leader position these two courses are available online at www.olec.scouting.org.

Supplemental Training Modules On-line

Supplemental training modules are also available online. They are designed to provide orientation beyond the basic training offered in *This Is Scouting* and leader-specific training. Each module is a unit of training that can be used as an outline for a group, for personal coaching, or for self-study. Most of the outlines should require about an hour to complete. Consider each unit of study to be an introduction to the subject. Scouters are welcome to download subjects that are of interest for personal or unit use. There are no training credits associated with the completion of these units of study. Additional training units are being developed and will be continually added to this site.

Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation (BALOO) November 21

This course is for Cub Scout leaders. For packs wishing to camp it is mandatory that at least one leader in attendance has completed the course. Of course, we are hoping packs will send several leaders. BALOO covers basic camping skills with a heavy emphasis on the BSA-approved techniques for providing a safe and fun camping experience for both cubs and their parents and leaders. BALOO training is not mandatory for Webelos den camping. The course will be held in conjunction with Pow Wow at Annandale High School.

MERIT BADGE COUNSELORS

This is for those who want to become a Merit Badge Counselor or want to change the Merit Badges they teach.

- The BSA requires information on Adult Volunteer applications to permit background checks. This requirement to register is an annual requirement - I will provide guidance on how we will meet that requirement as we get closer to the annual deadline.
- To become a MB counselor provide me with both a completed MB counselor form and a completed Adult Volunteer form. Note that the only signature required on the Adult Volunteer form is your own.
- I provide the information to our Council and list you on our OD District master list.
- Do not send either application to NCAC - they will not be used.
- Once you've sent me the forms, consider yourself "listed" and legal. You won't get a confirmation from me unless specifically requested.
- Several times a year or when requested, I publish the master list to the Old Dominion District Yahoo mail list. Please write if you want a copy.
- After you are on the District list, if you desire to make any changes to the Merit Badges that you teach, I only need an email, letter, phone call, or grab me at a meeting or campout and let me know what changes you need. No additional paperwork.
- I can provide via email both application forms and the District list and will send our current District list and both applications to the District Yahoo mailing list in early October.
- The purpose of the Merit Badge program is to give the scouts the experience of contacting a previously unknown counselor, setting appointments (with a buddy) and working off the requirements as agreed with the counselor. Second is the exposure to various subjects and skills. The BSA intent is not met when the scouts earn their merit badges through a stable of Troop counselors, most of whom they already know. Clearly we have safety and youth protection issues that were not as prevalent in the early years of scouting. Do your best to meet both goals. Additional guidance and background is readily available at a number of BSA websites.

Hike-o-ree: The 20th Annual V3 (Venturing, Varsity, and Venture) Hike-o-ree will be held on, November 6-8, 2009, at the Northern Virginia 4-H Educational Center, Front Royal, VA. Registration will be limited to trail capacities of the fifteen trails. The Hike-o-ree is open to all Scout units including Venturing Crews, Sea Scout Ships, Varsity Teams, and Troops.

Units are encouraged to form trail crews, consisting of no more than twelve members, including at least two adults. Participation minimum age for Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts is 13 years old as of January 1, 2010. Girl Scout troops will be required to have at least one leader trained at the 200 level, a first aider with current CPR certification and a sufficient number of adults to meet the girl adult ratio requirements of Safety-Wise. Training at the 250 or 260 level would provide beneficial information for this event, but is not mandatory. Girl Scout troops should submit a 'Request for Council Approval' form to Girl Scout Council of the Nation's Capital. BSA units should file tour permits with National Capital Area Council.

Trail crews will be assigned a hike based on their preferences indicated on the registration form. All hikes are approximately ten miles in length and range in difficulty from moderate (1500 foot change in elevation) to super strenuous (2600 foot change in elevation). Other Hike-o-ree activities include a Friday night opening campfire, a high adventure rally on Saturday night, and a service project on Sunday morning. Camping Friday and Saturday night at the 4-H Center is backpacking style using ONLY backpacking equipment. Please do not bring chuck boxes, coolers, Dutch ovens, propane tanks, camp lanterns, and lawn chairs!!! Bring ONLY what you can carry in your backpack. Crews will receive their t-shirts at the completion of the Hike-o-ree.

Registration will be made on a *FIRST COME, FIRST SERVE BASIS*. An initial deposit of \$60.00 is due to reserve a particular hike and must be made not later than October 15, 2008.
