

History and Terms

The Cursillo movement began in Spain in the late 1940s as a means of preparing people for a religious pilgrimage within the Roman Catholic Church. These short courses ('Cursillos') were brought to the United States in Spanish in 1957. By 1961, Cursillos in English were held with the purpose of developing lay ministry. The first Cursillo weekend in the Episcopal Church was conducted in the early 1960's with help from Roman Catholic sponsors in the Diocese of Iowa, and came to the Diocese of Long Island in 1979.

The movement of Cursillos in Christianity is a powerful instrument of renewal in the Church. Its aim is to concentrate closely on the Person and teachings of Jesus Christ. The Cursillo gives those who attend it a living understanding of basic Christian truths and the desire to serve Christ within the fellowship of His Church. What's more, it provides a means to continue the Christian formation which is just begun in the three-day exercises.

Cursillo refers to a 'short course' in Christian living

Cursillista someone who has made a Cursillo

De Colores a song which is sung during the weekend; it means 'the colors' and symbolizes the many facets of God's love for us

Palanca prayers offered on the Cursillista's behalf

Ultreya a Spanish word that is roughly translated 'onward' or 'keep going.' It is a word of encouragement for all of us in our Christian vocation and ministry.

Group Reunion a small group who meet weekly and who hold each other accountable for their spiritual journey. We share our spiritual growth as well as our growth in becoming a person who strives to bring a Christ-like attitude to our environments

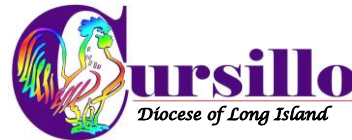
Fourth Day the 'after' activity of the Cursillo. It is a starting point that lasts the rest of your life

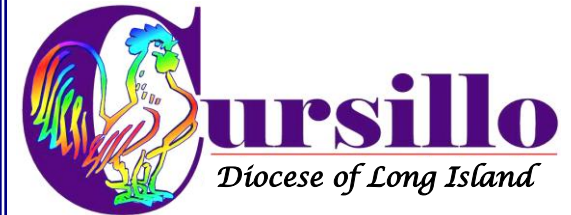

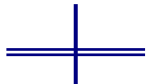
Cursillo in Christianity

Frequently Asked Questions

Can Christianity penetrate the many areas of secular life in today's world? Can it live there? Can it grow there? Can it transform the world in a way that is more fruitful than the past and in keeping with the times? The Cursillo movement thinks so! It proposes no new type of spirituality, but simply a method through which one's spirituality may be developed, lived and shared in any area of human life where there are Christians willing to dedicate their lives to God.

The purpose of Cursillo is to help those in the Church understand their individual callings to be Christian leaders. The leadership may be exercised in one's work situations, in one's family and social life, in one's leisure activities, and within the Church environment. Leadership, in Cursillo, does not mean power over others, but *influence* on others; all of us need to be aware that we can exert a positive influence on those around us.

The goal of Cursillo is the goal of the Church: to bring all to Christ. This is done when informed, trained leaders set out with the support of others having a similar commitment.

Cursillo is patterned on Jesus' own example. He searched out and called a small group of potential leaders (pre-Cursillo); He trained them by word and example and inspired them with a vision (Cursillo Weekend); He linked them together and sent them out into the world to bring the world to Him (post-Cursillo or the Fourth Day).

Persons who are part of Cursillo start by attending a three-day weekend. It is a 'retreat' only in the sense that the group attempts to limit the influence of the outside world. The word 'advance' would probably be more descriptive. The Cursillo weekend is a deeply moving time in which we ask ourselves: *What am I doing here? What does God want of me? What does Christ see in me? What do I see in Christ? What is Christ saying to me?*

Pre-Cursillo

During this period, sponsors identify and recommend for Cursillo those individuals who are leading an active Christian life and are a living witness to their love of Christ. It is also the period that candidates are assisted in making appropriate preparations.

Three-Day Weekend

The Cursillo weekend brings together a diverse group of Episcopalians to share the richness of many styles of worship and to broaden each one's appreciation for our Church. Lay people conduct the weekend with two or three members of the clergy functioning as spiritual advisors. Cursillo presumes that those who attend are already well grounded in the faith. It is not intended to be a conversion experience but an enriching and deepening of what is already there.

The weekend begins Thursday evening spent in the Chapel with meditations and Compline. Then silence is kept until after the worship on Friday morning. After breakfast, participants are assigned to table groups for the weekend. The next two days are filled with talks and group discussions with emphasis on Grace, the Sacraments, and the great Cursillo tripod: Piety, Study, and Action. Plus there is fellowship, singing, good food, and lots of laughter, as well as time for privacy, meditation, and prayer. Eucharist is celebrated daily.

Post Cursillo or Fourth Day

The Cursillo weekend is not an end to itself. It is a starting point that lasts the rest of your life. The Fourth Day is composed of three major elements:

The Group Reunion, the heart of Cursillo, is a small group of friends who meet weekly and who hold each other accountable for their spiritual journey.

Ultreya, which is usually held monthly, is a "reunion of the reunions." It provides support and builds community by allowing the sharing of communal experiences.

Spiritual Direction is a commitment to seek out skilled lay persons or cleric for spiritual direction to provide help in deepening their union with Christ.

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Who can attend?

Any Episcopalian, twenty-five years of age or older, may attend a Cursillo.

Are there Cursillo secrets?

You may have been told by someone who has attended the weekend that he cannot tell you what Cursillo is all about or what goes on during a Cursillo weekend. This is not correct. Everything that goes on during the weekend may be told to anyone. Cursillo literature is available to anyone who wishes to read or purchase the materials.

How much does it cost?

Cursillo was started in the Diocese so that each weekend pays for the one after it. We ask a donation to cover the cost of a person attending a subsequent weekend, but nobody has ever been, nor will ever be, turned away based on their ability to contribute.

What if I don't have a sponsor?

Your sponsor is an invaluable support person before, during, and after your Cursillo experience. If you are interested in attending Cursillo and don't have a sponsor, contact your parish priest and he or she will help you find a sponsor.

How do I sign up?

Applications are available from your church office or from www.licursillo.org. Call your church secretary or speak to your parish priest.

When is the next Cursillo?

Cursillo weekends are offered several times per year at Montfort in Bay Shore, NY. In addition, there is a Spanish-language weekend offered on Memorial Day weekend in May. Check the website for specific dates of upcoming weekends.
