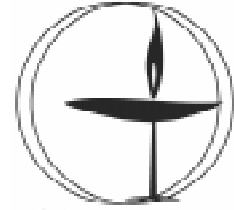

"Splinters From The Board"

Your Board has been very busy! By July 1, the Membership Committee will make the Membership Book available for new-member signing on Sunday mornings.

In order to reduce the number of printed newsletters which must be mailed, several Board members have adopted most of the people who do not have email or printer capabilities. They will print and hand-deliver these Beacons to recipients at church on Sunday.

Any monies raised from the sale (eBay perhaps) of jewelry and furs donated to the church earlier this year has been designated to go into the UUCL operating fund. This action will give the Board more flexibility in dealing with building repairs and emergencies.

Although no formal motions were made (tabled until the June Board meeting) a proposal to provide more variety on Sunday mornings was discussed and the following changes put into consideration:

1. CUUPs (Covenant of Unitarian Universalist Pagans) to meet at 1:00 pm on Sundays instead of 4:00 as it does now..
2. After-church business meetings to be moved to other time slots
3. The Board to meet from 7:00 to 8:30 pm on the THIRD THURSDAY of each month.
4. An ad hoc committee (Tom Evans, Sharon Becker, Elaine Lehmann, Robert Tucker) will meet this summer to explore further Sunday changes and make recommendations to the Board.
5. Beginning July 1, 2007, office secretary Lee Myers will implement the UUCL mass email for purposes of: announcing new members, directory changes, emergencies, notification that the Beacon is ready for access by e-mail, and link.
6. Dr. Tucker is relieved of all such responsibility, though he may certainly use mass e-mail as part of his pastoral and ministerial responsibilities.

One final reminder: anyone may come as an observer to the Board meetings or, for that matter, any other meetings save those of the Ministerial Relations Committee and the Committee on Congregational Relations, when the latter is dealing with a personal complaint between two or more persons.

How very fortunate we are to have had our Florida District Executive, Kenn Hurto, lead our May 26 retreat for committee chairs and Board members. Since not everyone was there, I'll use this space to highlight some of Kenn's pithy, insightful comments:

- ◆ "The urgent will always drive out the important"
- ◆ "Leaders do the right thing; managers do the thing right"
- ◆ "What would happen if we didn't do _____?"
- ◆ "Abolish all committees once a year"
- ◆ "In a healthy congregation, the majority doesn't beat up on the minority"
- ◆ "In a healthy congregation, the minority doesn't sabotage the majority"
- ◆ "Our guiding question asked for any action should be: Is it for the GOOD of the ORDER?"

Kenn also gave the Board (which met alone with him in the afternoon) some very concrete guidance for meetings and process.

Ideas put forth by everyone were discussed and will be used by the Board to guide action in the future.

Thanks to all of you who attended, and especially to Mary Grove who provided the lunch and snacks, and to Orrinna Speese who brought lots of donuts.

At our Town Meeting of May 13, thirty people spoke to the question of our important issues for the coming year. Several expressed sadness that we've lost members due to tension apparent on Sundays. Some people advocated a more contemporary Sunday service, and many stressed more civility in keeping with our new Covenant. Please read "Splinters from the Board" to learn what positive action your governing board is proposing. Printed copies of the summary for the May Town Meeting are available at the church.

Speaking of Town Meetings, I need to remind everyone that Dr. Tucker agreed, prior to the August 2006 town meeting, to mass e-mail the summary to everyone. He kept his word. However, afterwards he said that he would not do so again because factual errors had appeared, and that he could not, in good conscience, endorse any mass mailings of such summaries under his ministerial screenname of UUCLaLandFL. I agreed. We have, instead, made all summaries available through the Office and at the Visitor's Desk.

How Big Is Your Carbon Footprint?

By now the impact of Global Warming should have become clear to all of us. The increasingly damaging effects of our pumping untold amounts of harmful gases into our atmosphere are taking their toll on the quality not only of our air, but our water. Moreover, they are endangering the existence of many species of animal and plant life, as well as beginning to alter our climate in harmful ways that will bring about droughts and floods, increased destructive weather patterns, and all the problems associated with such things, including starvation, disease and death, pestilence, human migration/dislocation, and even increased incentives for acts of terror and outbreaks of wars around the globe. I summarized many of these things in my sermon on our 7th U.U. Principle, "Respecting the Web of Life," delivered on Earth Day, April 22.

There is, however, much good news on the horizon. One piece of that has to do with a new initiative to help all of us, and especially our city officials, better understand how we are contributing to global warming, and how we might reduce those amounts. Announced May 15 in New York at the C40 Large Cities Climate Summit, a conference of mayors from around the world, it involves a Web-based carbon calculator for personal and municipal use. Called GoZero Footprint City Calculator, it is the product of collaboration between Zerofootprint (a nonprofit group that provides information and services to combat global warming) and Business Objects (a maker of business intelligence software). "On the interactive climate site, people will be able to enter data, see the carbon effect and how their carbon footprint compares with averages in their city and in cities worldwide. They will also be able to do what-if simulations, to see how changes in their activities affect carbon emissions. The anonymous data will be collected for analysis by climate change scientists and others." [Steve Lohr, "On the Web, an Advanced Carbon Calculator for Personal Use, New York Times, 15 May 2007] A link to mock-ups of the new site appears under the "initiatives" section of

www.zerofootprint.net and the Toronto version mock-up is accessible at www.zerofootprinttoronto.org/ZFPToronto.aspx (click on graph). A children's version is also available at: www.zerofootprintkids.com. Each is fun and easy to use. By answering several simple questions, one gets a read-out on how large his/her individual carbon footprint is in comparison to people in several countries. (Some local power companies offer similar self-tests, but do not provide the large-scale analysis the zerofootprint sites will eventually make available.)

The mayors' summit was a four-day gathering with Mayor Michael R. Bloomberg as its host. It was partly sponsored by the Clinton Climate Initiative, a project led by former President Bill Clinton. Two years ago, a similar summit took place in London. The reason: cities are responsible (according to the organizers) for $\frac{3}{4}$ of the world's energy consumption and thus have a crucial role to play in reducing the carbon emissions threatening our climate.

The city of Toronto has become the first municipality to partner with Zerofootprint. In Phase One, 40,000 city employees will be invited to calculate their environmental footprints and create goals to reduce them over time. Phase Two will make the calculator accessible to all Toronto citizens.

From individuals to their cities, from the cities to whole nations, the ultimate goal of this new technology is to enable entire countries to do self-analyses so as to know how best to combat the rise of global warming.

Knowing our own carbon footprint is one of many small, simple, but important ways that we can live out our 7th Principle of respecting the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part. So, please, check it out!

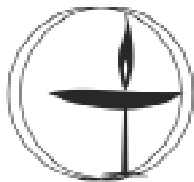

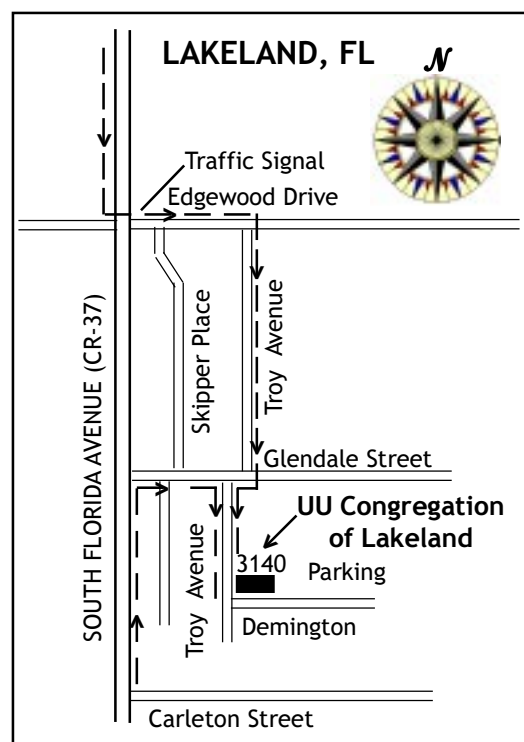
